The airfield at St Athan is managed on our behalf by the Ministry of Defence under an Airfield Management Agreement signed in 2003. The airfield operates under military administration subject to inspection and certification by MoD.

The contract of works for the reconstruction of the runaway at St Athan was awarded by the MoD under the Defence Estates Regional Prime Contracting Programme. Further requests for details of the contract should be referred to the Ministry of Defence.

As owner of the airfield and responsible for its upkeep and safety, the Assembly Government funded the cost of the runway reconstruction works. Appropriate mechanisms, including risk management and joint working, were put in place to ensure that Defence Estates properly evaluated the technical, commercial and pricing aspects of the project. For example, any pricing received from the Prime Contractor was evaluated and value for money checked before being forwarded to us for approval and payment.

Brian Gibbons (**Aberavon**): Will the Minister make a statement on why the workplace GVA for "Agriculture, hunting and forestry" in Wales has declined from £532 in 2000 to £145 in 2008 in contrast to an increase in England. (WAQ57146)

Answer issued on 22 February 2011

Data from the ONS shows that there was a decline in Gross Value Added (GVA) between 2000 and 2008 in the agricultural sector but GVA in the hunting and forestry sectors increased. This response therefore centres on changes to GVA from agriculture during the period.

There are two principle reasons for the decline in agricultural GVA in Wales between 2000 and 2008.

The first reason relates to CAP reform and the way that different subsidy payments are treated in the National Accounts. In 2005, the Single Payment Scheme (SPS) was introduced, replacing subsidy schemes that were directly linked to agricultural production levels (for example, Suckler Cow Premium, Sheep Annual Premium etc.). National Accounting principles means that payments under the 'coupled' schemes were included in the calculation of GVA in 2000 to 2004, however, the SPS is not included in the calculation of GVA in 2005 to 2008. For this reason, the ONS data shows a large step change (downwards) in GVA from agriculture across all regions between 2004 and 2005. The value of direct subsidy payments in Wales in 2000 was approximately £200 million.

The second reason – and the explanation for why GVA declined in Wales but increased in England – relates to the structure of the agricultural industry in Wales and changes in market prices. Over 70% of agricultural output in Wales is generated by the dairy, beef and sheep sectors, this means that GVA in Wales is relatively exposed to fluctuations in the market prices for those commodities. Beef and lamb prices were relatively low in 2006-2007 and although they had started to increase by 2008, the low returns coupled with rising input costs resulted in a fall in agricultural GVA in Wales.

In contrast, the agricultural industry in England is relatively diverse and the increase in agricultural GVA in 2007 and 2008 can largely be attributed to the significant increases in global cereal prices. Given the small size of the cereal sector in Wales, the impact of these prices increases was minimal.

Paul Davies (Preseli Pembrokeshire): Will the Minister detail how much it is costing the Welsh Assembly Government to monitor the fishing industry in Cardigan Bay. (WAQ57153)

The Welsh Assembly Government undertakes its statutory responsibilities for fisheries management and enforcement through a risk-based approach to enforcement that is applied around the whole of the Welsh coastline and adjacent waters. This approach is informed by a range of monitoring and enforcement data that directs the enforcement activity undertaken through sea, aerial and remote monitoring surveillance and shore based measures.

Enforcement is therefore a complex activity and as it is managed across the whole of Wales, it is not possible to separate out individual costs for Cardigan Bay, or any other part of the coast. The budget for this activity across Wales is approximately £1.2m, which comprises 22 enforcement staff (shore based and at sea), 2 fisheries patrol vessels and the mobile equipment necessary to undertake statutory enforcement.

In addition, the Royal Navy undertakes sea patrols through a joint management approach with the Marine Management Organisation who are responsible for this activity in England.
