Waste Management

Introduction

Waste management is a topic of considerable importance in Wales. Space for landfill - still the main waste disposal method - is running out, and European legislation requires substantial changes in the way that waste is treated.

National targets for recycling have been set in order to help Welsh local authorities meet their landfill targets: by 2009/10, at least 40 per cent of municipal waste should be recycled or composted, and the Minister for Environment, Sustainability and Housing has a stated desire to see 70 per cent recycling/composting by 2025. Unfortunately, in some cases, even meeting the 2009/10 target will not be enough for a local authority to meet its Landfill Directive requirements.

- If present trends continue, 15 local authorities in Wales will fail to meet the 2012/13 Landfill Directive targets, resulting in fines of nearly £27 million.
- At current rates of increase of recycling and composting, 10 local authorities will meet the 40 per cent target in 2009/10, whilst the remaining 12 will fail to meet the target.
- In order to meet the 2020 target of 300kg of waste production per person, household waste needs to decrease by 4 per cent annually from 2006/07.

Current and proposed legislative competence of the Assembly

Under the *Government of Wales Act 2006*, the National Assembly for Wales can seek legislative competence through Acts of Parliament or Legislative Competence Orders (LCOs) to make a piece of law in the form of an 'Assembly Measure'. Measures can only be made in a specific policy area (or 'Matter') added to one of the 20 'Fields' (or broad subject areas) which are contained in Schedule 5 to the Act.

As 'Environment' is field 6 of Schedule 5 to the Government of Wales Act 2006, the National Assembly for Wales can seek Measure-making powers in this area. The Environmental Protection and Waste Management Legislative Competence Order, currently in progress, would provide wide-ranging opportunities for primary legislation to the National Assembly for Wales. Nerys Evans' proposed Measure on Recycling would require local authorities to report on the amount of recyclate exported.

Forthcoming EU and UK primary legislation

- Various sections of the *Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005* are in the process of coming into force in Wales.
- The EU Waste Framework Directive is currently being revised.

EU Policy

The EU has wide jurisdiction over environmental matters, including waste management.

- The IPPC Directive of September 1996 (codified in 2008)⁺ imposes a requirement for industries with high pollution potential to have a permit.
- In December 2005, the European Commission published a strategy" on the prevention and recycling of waste.
- The Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment Directive^{III} of January 2003 requires Member States to set up separate collection facilities for such waste.
- The Waste Incineration Directive^{iv} of December 2000 controls the incineration of waste.
- The End-of-life Vehicles Directive^v of September 2000 means that as from 1 January 2007, free recycling facilities must be available for all vehicles at the end of their lives.

- The Landfill Directive^{vi} of April 1999 is the biggest current driver of waste management operations in Wales.
- Under the Batteries Directive^{vii}, free collection for portable batteries must be in place by September 2008. Minimum collection rates are stipulated.
- The Packaging Directive^{viii} of December 1994 (as amended) is the primary tool for control of packaging.

Key Welsh Government strategy documents and action plans

- The One Wales agreement commits the Welsh Assembly Government to improve targets for recycling with legislation and support for better and more coordinated waste management.
- The *Environment Strategy for Wales*^{ix} and its accompanying Action Plan^x have sections dedicated to waste management.
- The *National Waste Strategy for Wales* is the waste management strategy^{xi}. It is currently undergoing revision.
