# Water and Flood Defence

## Introduction

Water has profound aesthetic and cultural appeal as well as value as a resource for industry, agriculture and use in homes. Rivers, lakes and streams and the bathing waters along our coast play an important role in people's quality of life, and maintaining the good quality of water bodies is vital for supporting habitats and biodiversity. Water is also important for many recreation activities and helps attract tourism to all parts of Wales.

Flood and coastal erosion pose a threat to quality of life. When flooding occurs it frequently causes economic damage and general disruption as well as significant personal trauma. Flooding and erosion are natural phenomena that cannot be entirely prevented. In Wales it is estimated that more than 500,000 people live and work on floodplains, and approximately £8 billion of assets – including more than 150,000 residential properties – are at risk from flooding<sup>1</sup>.

# Current and proposed legislative competence of the Assembly

Under the *Government of Wales Act 2006*, the National Assembly for Wales can seek legislative competence through Acts of Parliament or Legislative Competence Orders (LCOs) to make a piece of law in the form of an 'Assembly Measure'. Measures can only be made in a specific policy area (or 'Matter') added to one of the 20 'Fields' (or broad subject areas) which are contained in Schedule 5 to the Act.

As 'Water and flood defence' is field 19 of Schedule 5 to the *Government of Wales Act 2006*, the National Assembly for Wales can seek Measure-making powers in this area. Currently there are no Matters in this field.

# Forthcoming EU and UK primary legislation

- A Draft Marine Bill was published on 3 April 2008.
- The Floods Directive entered into force on 26 November 2007".
- The European Commission published its vision for an Integrated Maritime Policy for the EU on 10 October 2007.
- The European Commission has adopted a Groundwater Directive<sup>III</sup>.
- In July 2006, the European Commission adopted a proposed Directive on chemical pollution of surface waters<sup>™</sup>.
- A new Bathing Water Directive was adopted on 15 February 2006<sup>v</sup>.

#### **EU Policy**

The EU has wide jurisdiction over matters regarding water. Principally, it legislates in aspects of bathing water quality, chemicals in water, drinking water, floods, groundwater, marine issues, urban wastewater, and river basin management (under the Water Framework Directive). Policies are geared towards improving water quality, reducing flood risk, and more efficient management of the water resource.

Updated information on the development, implementation, and review of water policies is available twice a year through the Water Information System for Europe newsletter<sup>ix</sup>.

The European Environment Agency also has a comprehensive site covering water issues, including European waters, water pollution, monitoring, water resources, and water management<sup>\*</sup>.

## Key Welsh Government strategy documents and action plans

- The Environment Strategy for Wales<sup>xi</sup> and its accompanying Action Plan<sup>xii</sup> have three outcomes for water resources and two for flood and coastal erosion risk management.
- Starting to Live Differently<sup>xiii</sup> is the sustainable development scheme of the National Assembly for Wales. It
  is accompanied by a Sustainable Development Action Plan<sup>xiv</sup>.
- Technical Advice Note 15 covers development and flood risk.
