## Request for Information.

Thank you for your request received on 10 March in which you asked,

I would like to know how many staff days of work at your body/authority/institution were lost to last Thursday's Welsh law-making powers referendum. To clarify, by this I mean I would like to know how many staff were diverted from their usual daily job on Thursday, March 3, and Friday, March 4, to staff the referendum in some way (counting votes, for example). I would like to know the total number and also a breakdown of those numbers in terms of what those people did on the days.

No National Assembly for Wales staff were diverted from their usual jobs to count votes or staff last month's Referendum.

Although the national counting centre was located on the Assembly's premises (the Senedd) the count was conducted entirely by and under the supervision of the Electoral Commission, who booked the Senedd to use for that purpose. No Assembly staff took part in the conduct of the referendum or the counting or declaration of the results at the Senedd.

Accommodating an event of this size in the Senedd did to some extent involve services within the Assembly, for example staff from Information and Communications Technology, Visitor's services and the Events and Facilities team, were to some extent involved in supporting the event, in the same way as they would have been involved in relation to the holding of any event on the premises. Since, however, this would be deemed to be an integral part of their normal day to day responsibilities in supporting all events which take place on the Assembly Estate it would not be accurate to describe them as being involved in the staffing the referendum and there are no records which would enable their normal activities on the day in question to be allocated between that event and other routine duties.
