Edwina Hart: We continue to promote the food and hospitality industries in Wales and aim to develop a positive food culture in Wales through specific projects such as regional food tourism initiatives that are organised with Regional Tourism Partnerships across Wales. Activities supporting these projects include training sessions promoting the benefits of using local produce, 'Meet the Buyer' events aimed at bringing together the hospitality and food producing sectors, and promotional events including cookery demonstrations and master classes focussing on local food. In addition, we continue to support key food festivals across Wales. Evaluation has shown that these Food festivals provide significant benefits to these sectors and the local economy.

The Minister for Education and Skills (Leighton Andrews): There are a number of in-school programmes that support young people demonstrating risky behaviours. These programmes are generally designed and delivered by local authorities and schools and thus will vary based on local needs and priorities.

Of particular relevance is:

• School-based counselling which has been gradually rolled out across local authorities, with all secondary schools being covered since the autumn of 2010. From April 2013 local authorities will be

required to make counselling provision available to all children and young people aged between 11 and 19 in their area;

• Behaviour management and support - all maintained schools must have a clear behaviour policy. To enable better support the Welsh Government is funding four local authorities to test specific approaches and has issued guidance on behaviour management;

• The All Wales School Liaison Core Programme (AWSLCP) has been developed in recognition of the role that schools and education can play in tackling anti-social behaviour, substance misuse and problems associated with personal safety. The AWSLCP approach is mainly preventative and is delivered by uniformed police in the classroom;

• Substance misuse education has been the subject of a recent Welsh Government consultation. It recognised that a 'one size fits all' approach is not appropriate and proposed a fully integrated multi-agency approach with programmes tailored to individual learner and family needs; and

• In many local authorities youth work teams work in partnership with schools to provide informal learning opportunities to those needing additional support.

The Welsh Government expects that:

• Effective screening and assessment takes places to identify needs and inform education and sentence planning;

The curriculum offer is as broad as possible within the constraints of a custodial environment;

• Enrichment programmes are offered which provide structured activities in stimulating and motivating contexts;

• Importance is placed on a broad range of learning opportunities such as basic skills, engagement activities, personal and social learning, vocational learning, as well as classroom based learning;

• Employability skills are increased through practical and vocational activities;

• Programmes relate coherently into learning, training and employment opportunities; and

• There is linkage to support via youth offending teams, Careers Wales services, and wider multiagency services as part of community re-integration.

Leighton Andrews: Schools are required to have a written policy for dealing with the education of children with medical needs. The policy should include whether the school accepts responsibility for administering or supervising the use of medication or equipment (this is a voluntary responsibility); a named contact within the school for parents to contact should they wish to raise concerns regarding health matters; its policy for assisting children with long term or complex needs; and its emergency procedures.

Teachers and Higher Level Teaching Assistants working with children and young people are required to meet professional standards. These include ensuring that they understand the factors affecting individual learners that could have an impact on them achieving their potential, and be able to apply strategies for addressing these issues.

There is no specific scheme addressing asthma awareness.

Leighton Andrews: With the Minister for Heritage, I have set up the Schools and Physical Activity Task and Finish Group (SPA), to provide advice on how to develop the role of schools in increasing levels of physical activity in children and young people. The group is chaired by Baroness Tanni Grey-Thomson and is due to report with recommendations in summer 2013. The group's recommendations will be considered alongside the current review of assessment and the National Curriculum in Wales, and in the context of the more wide ranging review underway on delivery of education services which I announced last November.

Alongside this, we continue to support schools to improve provision for physical education and the range and quality of opportunities available to pupils through the PE and School Sports (PESS) initiative. Sport Wales is leading on this work in partnership with schools and local authorities. Since 2001, the Welsh Government has invested £20.7m in PESS which is delivering a wide range of training and resources for teachers to help schools improve practice in provision of PE and Sport. A further £2.35m has been made available to Sport Wales in 2012-13 to take PESS work forward, and provision at the same level has been agreed for 2013-14. All schools in Wales have had the opportunity to be involved.

As part of PESS, we have ensured that all secondary schools now provide access for all young people to accredited sports leadership training and this work is being rolled out in primary schools. Within the current PESS programme we are also supporting the development of pilot work which aims to encourage the empowerment of teachers and is targeted at disengaged young people. The work runs until summer 2014 and includes a specific focus on making PE more appealing to girls, with strategies aimed at increasing participation of girls in physical activity. PESS also promotes the ActiveMarc Cymru quality award offering schools the opportunity to achieve recognition for their commitment to developing and providing high-quality PE and school sport and in promoting the benefits of physical activity.

Estyn has regularly evaluated the PESS Initiative; evidence shows that this work is making a significant impact in improving the quality and range of opportunities provided for young people to engage in physical activity.

PESS complements wider programmes to extend opportunities for extra-curricular sport, including the 5x60 programme in secondary schools and Dragon Sport in primary schools, and provided the platform for work with schools to capitalise on the opportunities provided by the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Leighton Andrews: In May 2012, I wrote to all local authorities about the level of surplus school places and asked all local authorities to provide me with an achievable challenging target for the reduction of school places by January 2015.

I challenged 16 local authorities with high levels of surplus places (either with over 20% surplus places, or a forecast of over 20%, in either sector) to consider what progress they could make towards a target of 15% by 2015. I then also asked the remaining 6 local authorities to provide a statement on how they would manage their places to that date, and what their anticipated position would be in 2015.

Local authorities provided statements which included their own targets for both the primary and secondary school sectors. I subsequently wrote to all local authorities challenging them again on their ability to meet the targets set by themselves.

Local authorities will be monitored to ensure that they make progress towards meeting their targets. Local authorities are in the main being monitored on an annual basis, but 10 local authorities are being monitored quarterly because the levels of surplus capacity they have are of a particular concern. I was also clear to all local authorities that I would consider using my intervention powers (available under Schedule 7 to the School Standards and Framework Act 1998) to direct local authorities to bring forward proposals should insufficient progress be made against agreed targets.

The targets set could apply separately to both the primary and secondary sectors and my intervention could apply to either or even both. Guidance on school organisation proposals sets out that ideally no more than 10% of school places should be empty, and this may be a longer term target for some local authorities than for others. This aim applies to the rate across a local authority, not to individual schools.

The Deputy Minister for Children and Social Services (Gwenda Thomas): The Social Services and Well-being (Wales) Bill introduces the portability of care and support plans for people with 'eligible needs' across Welsh local authority boundaries.

This means that if people with 'eligible needs' relocate within Wales, possibly to move closer to their families and/or carers, the receiving authority has a duty to maintain the persons need for care and support

(as far as is reasonably practical) as set out in the care plan. These duties remain in place until the new authority has had the opportunity to re-asses the persons needs and how they can address those needs through the provision of services available in their area.

Portability arrangements will not apply in relation to support plans for carers with eligible needs. However, as the Bill creates a duty on local authorities to undertake an assessment of carers' needs in their own right, this will be triggered when moving, so carers living within the new local authority's area can exercise this right. Other duties will also require local authorities to share information relating to a person's carer when they move across local authority areas of Wales.

There wil be clear arrangements in place through the new duties and the Code of Practice to support the Bill to ensure there is continuity of care and support for the cared for person and their carers when the move across areas of Wales.
