# Annex 1

## **Extracts from Petitions Committee meetings**

## 10 April 2008

Val Lloyd: Petition P-03-110, on north Wales hospitals, reads as follows.

'We/I the undersigned urge that North Wales links with hospitals in Liverpool be continued and object to the centralising in Cardiff and Swansea.'

I think that we covered this in the last meeting, did we not?

**Michael German:** What we have not done, and what I suggest we do, is ask the Minister to write a response that we can then pass on to the petitioner. I know that the Minister feels strongly about petitions being answered, and so, asking her to provide an answer to the petitioners should not be a problem. However, I suggest that, instead of informing the Minister, we ask her to give us a response to this matter—which she has done, anyway. We have it, so we could just pass it on to the petitioner.

**Val Lloyd:** I am quite content with that. If it gives more comfort to the petitioners, that is fine. I imagine that the same thing will apply to the next petition, P-03-111, which is on Llandudno breast unit, given that the Minister has publicly said that it is staying, following the review. So, we will write to the Minister formally on both of these, and send her reply to the petitioners. Thank you for that suggestion, Mike.

### 22 May 2008

Val Lloyd: That takes us to the final formal update on petition P-03-110/111, Llandudno breast surgery and north Wales hospitals. We have received a response from the Minister. This was a dual petition. One petition was to do with continuing north Wales hospitals' links with the Walton Centre for Neurology and Neurosurgery in Liverpool rather than with Cardiff and Swansea, which we have addressed. The other petition is about the removal of breast surgery treatment provision from Llandudno, and the Minister's letter points out that she has accepted the recommendations of the Burns review, which relates to enhancing breast care at Llandudno. So, I think that we can safely close this petition, because we have achieved what the petitioners wanted. It is rather nice to be able to say that.

Thank you for your letter of the 15<sup>th</sup> April 2008 regarding the petitions from the Aberconwy Liberal Democrats protesting against the removal of breast surgery services from Llandudno Hospital, and urging me to retain links with hospitals in Liverpool.

As you are aware from my letter to all Assembly Members on the 20<sup>th</sup> March 2008, I have accepted the recommendations in the Burns Review relating to further service enhancement at Llandudno Hospital, and have asked Conwy Local Health Board to take these recommendations forward in partnership with the NHS Trust, Community Health Council and local clinicians.

As I received a number of important representations from women patients, emphasising the advantages of single sex wards which Llandudno provides, I decided that the current breast care service should remain at Llandudno for the foreseeable future, whilst further work and advice is provided on a model of breast care services in North Wales.

Additionally, following discussions with clinicians, and in light of my acceptance of the recommendations in the Burns Review for the future service enhancement of Llandudno Hospital, I also stated that further work needs to be done to explore the possibility that Llandudno could become a centre of excellence for breast care services.

I am committed to continually improving the care that patients receive in Wales, a this is demonstrated by the progress made to date in reducing waiting times. Ensuring that patients are provided with services of the highest quality and safet

an necessitate the use of both Welsh and English trusts, depending on the needs of each individual patient. We have agreements with hospitals in England, including Liverpool, to ensure that Welsh patients have access to these services.

I trust this information is of assistance.
