1. Emerging Issues

Children's Commissioner for Wales Press Release, <u>Children's Commissioner publishes</u> <u>findings of nationwide research about young carers in Wales</u>, 10 June 2009

Children's Commissioner for Wales (2009) <u>Full of Care - Young Carers in Wales</u>, 10 June 2009.

This report aims to show the barriers that young carers face in achieving the rights laid out by the United Nations Convention of the Rights of the Child, such as the right to education, to relax and play and to have their views respected.

Half of young carers 'can't cope' BBC News, [accessed 10 June 2009]
A report from the Children's Commissioner has found that more than half of young carers in Wales have felt they could not cope with their responsibilities during the course of a week.

Brindley, Madeline, <u>Young carers want ID cards - to prove they're not lying; Children's Commissioner calls on Assembly to consider the idea</u>, *Western Mail*, 10 June 2009, p.14 Children who care for sick relatives have called for the introduction of special ID cards to prove to teachers that they aren't lying about their plight.

Plotnikoff, J, and Woolfson, R, (July 2009) <u>Measuring Up? Evaluating implementation of</u> Government commitments to young witnesses in criminal proceedings.

The NSPCC has published research revealing young witnesses often have to wait more than a year to give evidence in Crown Court cases in England and Wales. In response to the findings, the NSPCC is calling for the UK Government to enforce its policy of fast-tracking criminal cases involving young witnesses and monitor delays.

Many children 'wrongly' locked up, BBC News [accessed 22 June 2009]
A report from the Prison Reform Trust (June 2009) called <u>Children: Innocent until proven quilty</u> says that up to three-quarters of children who are locked up before they appear in court do not subsequently receive a jail sentence.

Colquhoun, Fiona, (May 2009) <u>The relationship between child maltreatment, sexual abuse and subsequent suicide attempts</u>

This research report from the NSPCC looks at the link between different abusive experiences and suicidal ideation and active attempts.

Bagnall, Steve, <u>Suicide calls triple to Welsh child help line</u>, *Daily Post*, 1 June 2009, p.9 Calls to a Welsh helpline from distressed children contemplating suicide have more than tripled in five years.

Norman, Katie, <u>Youth services in Wales 'hindered by lack of information gathering'</u>, Western Mail, 11 June 2009, p.35

Major areas for improvement in local authorities' delivery of youth services have been highlighted by an Estyn report <u>Management information in local authority youth services</u> (June 2009).

Recession in Wales: nearly half the unemployed are under 25, BBC News [accessed 3 June 2009]

A Joseph Rowntree Foundation report <u>Monitoring Poverty and Social Exclusion in Wales</u> <u>2009</u> (June 2009) has found that nearly half of unemployed people in Wales are aged under 25.

Puffet, Neil, Neil

A <u>Review of Patient Safety for Children and Young People</u> carried out by the National Patient Safety Agency (NPSA), has found that more than 70 children in England and Wales died as a result of potentially avoidable medical lapses between 2007/08.

Mahadevan, Janaki, <u>NHS fails to meet disabled children's needs</u>, *Children and Young People Now*, 22 June 2009

A new report from the Every Disabled Child Matters campaign in England called <u>Disabled</u> <u>Children and Health</u> finds that the NHS is failing to meet the basic needs of disabled children.

Mahadevan, Janaki, <u>Social workers' low morale puts children at risk</u>, *Children and Young People Now*, 30 June 2009

A survey commissioned by the Local Government Association (LGA) in England revealed that 93 per cent of councillors in charge of children's services believe the reporting of the Baby P case had a negative impact on the way people regard social workers.

National Treatment Agency for Substance Misuse Press Release, <u>More young people</u> seek help for problems with drugs as services expand, 8 June 2009

Figures published by the National Treatment Agency (NTA) have shown that more people

in England under the age of 30 are getting help for problems with drugs.

The UK Government has set out plans for a Schools and Safeguarding Children Bill in its draft legislation programme for 2009/10. The bill would clarify the role of Ofsted and other inspectorates in inspecting Local Safeguarding Children Boards (LSCBs) and improve monitoring arrangements for children educated at home. <u>Focus on Children</u>, Office for National Statistics [accessed 1 July 2009] Focus on Children offers a statistical insight into the lives of the children in contemporary UK society. It includes information on their characteristics, experiences, wellbeing and lifestyle looked at from the child's perspective wherever possible.

2. Issues considered by the National Assembly's Children and Young People Committee

2.1 Looked after children

News Items and Press Releases

Children's Commissioner for Wales, <u>Welsh Children's Commissioner attacks care charge</u> plans, *Community Care* [posted 18 June 2009]

Keith Towler has said he is concerned about plans to charge parents who voluntarily place their children in local authority care, warning it could lead to family breakdown or homelessness.

Mahadevan, Janaki, <u>Councils 'capping' care places</u>, *Children and Young People Now,* 1 July 2009

Vulnerable children could be missing out on care home placements because local authorities are capping places, a leading residential care expert has claimed.

Mahadevan, Janaki, <u>Children's home staff must have better qualifications</u>, <u>Children and Young People Now</u>, 1 July 2009

The UK Government has pledged to strengthen minimum standards for training and development of staff in children's homes, in response to proposals by MPs to improve the care system.

Higgs, Lauren, <u>Bid to boost foster carers' rights</u>, *Children and Young People Now*, 28 May 2009

The leader of children's services union Aspect has written to the UK Government Children's Secretary to demand proper employment rights for foster carers.

Thomas Coram Institute (2009) <u>Working at the 'edges' of care? European models of support for young people and families</u>. London: Department for Children, Schools and Families

This is a cross national study into policy, practice and professional skills of the workforce in four European countries (Denmark, France, Germany and England) when working with young people aged 10-15 at or near the point of requiring accommodation outside their family.

Ofsted (July 2009) Support for care leavers

This study highlights examples of best practice provided to young people leaving care and is based on a small-scale survey of visits to six local authorities and four secure provisions; it also draws on evidence from social care inspection and takes account of care leavers' views and experiences. The report identifies how barriers to positive outcomes for care leavers have been overcome.

Clarke, Helen, (2009) <u>The age of foster care</u>, London: The Fostering Network The Fostering Network has looked at the age of current foster carers to identify whether there are any immediate concerns for the future of the provision of foster care. This report lists their findings.

Schofield, G, Simmonds, J., (2009), *The child placement handbook: research, policy and practice*. London: British Association for Adoption and Fostering

Norman, Katie, <u>More seek grant aid to pay for uniforms</u>, *Western Mail*, 11 June 2009, p.35 Parents in Wales have increasingly been accessing grants for school uniforms. A total of 6,374 pupils in Wales received Welsh Government-funded school uniform grants in the financial year 2007 to 2008 - an increase on 5,933 the previous year.

Welsh Assembly Government Press Release, <u>Disabled children benefit uptake scheme to</u> <u>tackle child poverty</u>, 12 May 2009

A £500,000 pilot scheme will look over the next two years at the best ways to increase the household incomes of families with disabled children. Citizen's Advice Cymru will deliver a campaign to increase benefit uptake as part of their existing Wales-wide Better Advice Better Health initiative.

Britain in 2009, York: Joseph Rowntree Foundation

This study updates 2008's innovative research, based on what members of the public thought people need for an acceptable minimum standard of living.

Winckler, Victoria, (25 June 2009), *What is needed to end child poverty in Wales?* York: Joseph Rowntree Foundation

The Welsh Government needs a clearer, more coherent and up-to-date approach to tackle child poverty in Wales, according to a study by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation.

Kenway, P, Palmer, G, MacInnes, T (2009) <u>Monitoring poverty and social exclusion in Wales</u>, York: Joseph Rowntree Foundation

This study reviews ten-year trends in Welsh low-income statistics. It looks at progress on low income since the mid-1990s; examines unemployment and problem debt in the current

recession and considers what action government could take to lessen the recession's impact on people in poverty.

End Child Poverty Cymru Network, (2009) <u>Briefing Paper: UK Government Budget 2009</u> This Briefing Paper calls on the UK Government to invest at least £3 billion on benefits and tax credits in time to reach the joint UK and Welsh Government target of halving child poverty by 2010.

End Child Poverty, (2009) *Keep the promise: End Child Poverty*A collection of essays from leading authors within the end child poverty coalition.

Lupton, Ruth, (2009) <u>Growing up in social housing in Britain: A profile of four generations</u> <u>from 1946 to the present day</u>, York: Joseph Rowntree Foundation

This study describes how housing for families has changed over time and explores the relationship between social housing, family circumstances and the 'adult outcomes' for children who grew up in social housing – i.e. their experiences when they are adults.

Statistics and commentary give an insight into the standard of living of the household population in the United Kingdom, focusing on the lower part of income distribution, for the period up to the end of 2007/08.

Sinclair, S, McKendrick, J (2009) *Child poverty in Scotland: taking the next steps, York;* Joseph Rowntree Foundation

This study discusses progress made in Scotland to end child poverty, and suggests what the Scotlish Government needs to do to reach the 2020 target.

Platt, Lucinda, (2009) <u>Ethnicity and child poverty</u>, Department of Work and Pensions This report aims to significantly develop the evidence base on ethnicity and child poverty. The report draws on a range of data sources to present a variety of poverty-related indicators - including income poverty, poverty persistence, material deprivation, and worklessness - for children and families from different ethnic groups.

The study also identifies key issues and messages to inform practice in England.

Morris, K, Barnes, M, Mason, P, (2009) *Children, families and social exclusion: new approaches to prevention,* London: The Policy Press. No electronic version available. A copy of this book can be borrowed from the Members' Library.

This book seeks to consider new approaches to understanding the complexities of prevention, and how these new understandings can inform policy and practice. The authors use evidence from the National Evaluation of the Children's Fund to illustrate and explore the experiences of children and families who are most marginalised.

Layard, Richard, Dunn Judy, (2009) *A good childhood: searching for values in a competitive age*, London: The Children's Society. No electronic version available. A copy can be borrowed from the Members' Library.

This book, which is a result of a two year investigation by the Children's Society and draws upon the work of the UK's leading experts in many fields, explores the main stresses and influences to which every child is exposed – family, friends, youth culture, values, and

schooling, and makes recommendations as to how we can improve the upbringing of children.
