Dear Mabon ap Gwynfor MS,

Thank you for your question at the plenary session of 8 December concerning coastal erosion in your constituency. You were seeking assurances that the relevant government bodies are undertaking the work necessary to safeguard life and property.

I can confirm that managing the risks associated with coastal erosion is a high priority for the Welsh Government. Evidence suggests that around 400 properties could be at risk from coastal erosion over the next 100 years across Wales, and the Welsh Government funds Coastal Local Authorities to develop schemes which help to manage that risk.

Gwynedd Council and Natural Resources Wales are the Risk Management Authorities responsible for managing the risk of coastal erosion in your constituency, including the community of Nefyn. As you mentioned in your question, the location is at high risk of landslides, and was subject to a recent cliff-fall event.

Risk Management Authorities must consider the Shoreline Management Plans (SMPs) when considering any interventions to reduce the risk of coastal erosion. SMPs are produced by Coastal Groups consisting of Local Authorities, Natural Resources Wales and other bodies with coastal interests such as National Trust and Network Rail. Whilst SMPs are non-statutory documents, the Welsh Government expects them to be used in both local and strategic decision making.

Funding for capital schemes which reduce the risk of coastal erosion is available through our Flood and Coastal Risk Management Programme. However, it is not possible to prevent all coastal erosion, or defend every section of coastline. It is for Risk Management Authorities, such as Gwynedd and Natural Resources Wales, to determine which locations are prioritised for coastal risk management schemes. Any proposals submitted to Welsh Government must meet eligibility criteria set out in our programme guidance and demonstrate they provide value for money.
