The Minister for Education and Skills (Leighton Andrews): The Welsh Government has plans for all band 4 and 5 schools. These do, however, vary in their level of detail, with some being relatively short, particularly where interventions have been across the whole authority or consortium with a limited amount of adaptation for individual schools. I have arranged for £10k to be made available to all band 4 and 5 schools in 2012/13. A condition of the payment of this grant is that detailed plans must be submitted to officials for consideration by the end of May 2012. Schools will not be able to access the grant unless they submit a robust, detailed plan.

The School Standards and Organisation Bill 2012 proposes making it a statutory requirement for all schools to draw up school development plans. Statutory guidance will set out what we expect to see included in the plans. The bill is expected to receive Royal Assent early in 2013.

The Deputy Minister for Children and Social Services (Gwenda Thomas): The consultation on the Bill seeks views of how we will define wellbeing for the purpose of social services. This draws on definitions used in existing law in relation to children, namely the Children Act 2004, and Government of Wales Act 2006. The working definition set out for consultation is:

In relation to individuals, wellbeing may relate to any of the following:

- 1) health and emotional well being;
 - 2) protection from harm or neglect;
 - 3) education, training and recreation;
 - 4) the contribution made by them to society;
 - 5) social and economic well-being; and,
 - 6) securing their rights.

The proposed definition of wellbeing of "people in need" will build on existing broad powers under the Local Government Act 2000 for local authorities to promote the improvement of the economic, social and environmental well-being of their area.

A new framework of national outcomes is being developed. This will reflect the commitment to wellbeing set out in the Bill. It will be underpinned by a performance framework which will allow us to measure our progress in achieving the national outcomes framework and measure how a social services intervention is contributing to an individual's wellbeing.

We will introduce the Bill this autumn and I will keep members fully informed of its development including the outcome of the public consultation process that closes on 1 June 2012.

The Minister for Local Government and Communities (Carl Sargeant): The Post Office Diversification Fund was re-opened in January 2009 in order to provide access to funding to sub-postmasters/mistresses seeking to improve the overall sustainability of their businesses. Grants of up to £20,000 are available to improve the retail side of the post office business in order to increase footfall and turnover for the whole business.

Two documents outline the terms and conditions of the PODF; the schedule of terms and conditions and the offer letter. Copies of the original documents are attached. To date these have only been amended to

change Welsh Assembly Government to Welsh Government; however, the documents will be reviewed before offers are made in the forthcoming April 2012 round of the PODF.

Carl Sargeant: a) As private businesses all post offices funded are paid in arrears. In order to release payment the sub-postmaster/mistress must supply a completed claim form and a copy of the relevant invoice(s) for the work carried out or equipment purchased. The claim form also contains a section for the post master to complete which provides officials with an update on the work being done as a result of the grant. This can also be used to provide early warning of any issues which may affect the grant. In addition to this a selection of post offices (around 10%) are visited by a case officer and the work/equipment is inspected as part of the visit. Those post offices not visited are asked to provide photographic evidence of the work carried out.

Should a post office close within five years of receiving a PODF grant then we will seek to claw back the grant on a sliding scale as detailed in the offer letter (attached to WAQ60113). Should the sub-postmaster not advise us of this development then we would pick up the details from the notification of closure automatically sent to us by Post Office Limited whenever there is a change to any post office service in Wales.

b) The PODF was independently evaluated in summer of 2011 and the report published in February 2012. The report contains several case studies showing the outcome for post offices receiving PODF funding. Its recommendations have been used to improve the PODF for the next three years. For the future of PODF the Welsh Government is keen to capture and measure many more of these outcomes. In order to do this officials will contact successful applicants one and two years after the completion of the grant using a mixture of visits and postal/telephone questionnaires to capture information. The PODF application form has been amended in order to collect baseline information to aid this process.
