Policy Focus: Higher Education





1. Higher Education policy

Higher education in Wales is offered mainly through Wales' 12 universities and higher education (HE) colleges including the Open University in Wales. It is also offered at a number of further education colleges.

Education, including higher education, in Wales has been a devolved policy area since devolution in 1999. Prior to this it was broadly the responsibility of the Secretary of State for Wales. Schedule 5 to the Government of Wales Act 2006 lists the Fields in which the Assembly has legislative competence, Field 5 is Education and Training. The Members' Research Service's <u>Assembly powers tracking notes: Field 5: Education and training</u> shows an up-to-date list of the Matters for which the Assembly has legislative competence and the policy areas in which Measures can be made.

Higher education institutions are private bodies which are independent of government. They receive their income from a number of sources, including from student fees, through research projects and by generating business. However, they also receive a portion of their income from public funds. The funds from the Welsh Government are distributed by the Higher Education Funding Council for Wales (HEFCW).

UK science policy rests with the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS) as does the funding of the <u>seven Research Councils</u>, which allocate public money to support research projects and teams in higher education institutions across the UK. BIS takes a lead role in furthering initiatives relating to links between business and higher education.

2. Recent Developments

In October 2009, Jane Hutt AM, Minister for Children, Education, Lifelong Learning and Skills ("the Minister") told the National Assembly's Enterprise and Learning Committee that she would be publishing her Twenty-First Century higher education plan in November 2009 and that there would be emphasis on a partnership approach.

It is a partnership approach to maximise efficiency and gain, not just collaboration between HEIs, but also with business, and it is very much on the agenda of economic renewal that the Deputy First Minister announced yesterday' RoP p26 Enterprise and Learning Committee, 14 October 2009



The Minister's new plan for higher education follows a two phase Review of Higher Education in Wales which was undertaken by a Task and Finish group, set up by the Welsh Government. The Task and Finish Group was chaired by Professor Merfyn Jones, Vice Chancellor of Bangor University.

The Minister announced the establishment of the Review on 25 June 2008. In its first stage the Review was asked to consider student finance arrangements in Wales: the extent to which student finance is targeted to enhance widening access opportunities and encourage take up of priority subjects; how best to tackle graduate debt in anticipation of the 2009 fee cap review in England; and how this is best achieved through national statutory student finance and locally delivered bursaries, scholarships etc.

Professor Mervyn Jones submitted the Group's report on this first stage of the Review to the Minister on 1 October 2008.

The Welsh Government then consulted on proposals to remodel the student finance system in Wales for full-time undergraduate students. The consultation was open from 8 December 2008 until 16 February 2009. 28 responses were received and are published on the Welsh Government website.

The Minister made an oral Statement on student finance on 18 March 2009. The key points were

We will phase out the tuition fee grant for new students from academic year 2010-11 and remodel the student finance system. We will redirect resources away from the tuition fee grant and allocate them as follows. A total of £44 million will be re-invested in the student finance system to enhance the Assembly learning grant. As a result, we will raise the level of a full Assembly learning grant from £2,906 in 2009-10 to £5,000 in 2010-11, which will have a particular impact on students from families with the lowest incomes. At the same time, and in order to ensure that no Welsh domiciled full-time undergraduate student is eligible for less grant support for living costs than they would be under the English 2009-10 student finance system, I will increase the household income threshold for partial Assembly learning grants by £10,000.

Oral Cabinet Statement - Higher Education Student Finance 18 March 2009

For phase two of the Review, the Task and Finish Group was asked to undertake a high-level Review of the "mission, purpose, role and funding for higher education in Wales". They submitted their report to the Minister on 27 April 2009.

The Task and Finish group made a large number of recommendations identifying key issues and priorities.





They also identified three fundamental challenges for the higher education sector:

- the strategic leadership of higher education in Wales (the need to address the tension between the Welsh Government's expectations of the sector and the sector's sense of its responsibility to act autonomously);
- configuration of provision (the geography and organisation of higher education in Wales not being fitted to achieving teaching or research benefits): and
- investment (the tension and dispute surrounding the current and future planning of higher education).

The Minister responded in an oral statement on 23 June 2009 in which she outlined four critical priorities:

- a revised approach to a national bursary framework;
- new ways of providing foundation degrees;
- new HE provision in the Heads of the Valleys and
- taking forward the Coleg Ffederal.

The Enterprise and Learning Committee published their report <u>Final report on</u> the Economic Contribution of Higher Education in Wales on 7 October 2009, following an in-depth inquiry.

On 29 October 2008, the Minister made an <u>Announcement of membership</u> and remit of the <u>Coleg Ffederal Planning Board</u> and the group, chaired by Professor Robin Williams published their report in June 2009: <u>Professor Robin William's report on a Coleg Ffederal model</u>
