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To ask the First Minister

Nicholas Bourne (Mid and West Wales): Will the First Minister list each recommendation of the Pennington inquiry into the 2005 E.coli outbreak and provide an update on Welsh Assembly Government progress in implementing each recommendation. (WAQ57028)

Only recommendations and 3, 16, 18 and 20 require action by the Welsh Assembly Government; progress is described below.

Recommendation 3 - Additional resources should be made available to ensure that all food businesses in Wales understand and use the HACCP (Hazard Analysis, Critical Control Point) approach and have in place an effective, documented, food safety management system which is embedded in working culture and practice.

I have asked the Food Standards Agency (FSA) to review food law enforcement procedures and structures in Wales. The findings of this review will enable me to consider future resourcing options.

Recommendation 16 - Businesses contracting for the supply of high-risk foods, such as raw and cooked meats, to public sector organisations must be subject to independent food hygiene audits.

From September 2009 there has been a public sector framework agreement with a private company for the provision of third party hygiene audits. The Welsh Assembly Government strongly encourages contracting authorities to follow this recommendation.

Value Wales has also produced a ' best practice 'framework' of food guidance for use by the public sector in Wales. This aims to provide a structured approach to food procurement and has been developed in conjunction with the Food Standards Agency, WLGA, Trading Standards, other WAG departments and the Value Wales Food Group.

The framework has been endorsed by the Chief Medical Officer, WLGA, FSA and Director General of Health & Social Services for Wales.

Recommendation 18 - Every local authority should have a programme of audits to ensure that all schools have adequate toilet and hand washing facilities.

Statutory responsibility for the provision of adequate school toilet facilities rests with local authorities. Not withstanding this, WAG is to issue good practice guidance to assist School Governing Bodies, Head Teachers and Local Authorities.

A Stakeholder Steering Group has helped develop the guidance and the Consultation on the Best Practise Guidance on standards for school toilets was published in November 2010. The consultation period ended on 24 January 2011 and included consulting with children and young people through the Pupil Voice Wales website and networks. Officials are now collating the responses and developing an action plan prior to the publication of the final guidance.

Recommendation 20 - The National Assembly for Wales should consider my recommendations and monitor and report progress on implementation.

On 7 July 2009, in plenary session, the then First Minister committed to reporting to the Assembly in 1 year and regularly thereafter. The Chief Medical Officer has agreed to act as the Welsh Assembly Government (WAG) 'point of contact' for the provision of updates to the First Minister and the Minister for Heath and Social Services. I reported to the Assembly in October 2010.

The Welsh Assembly Government will continue to monitor progress through routine reporting channels and with specific discussions when appropriate.

To ask the Minister for Children, Education and Lifelong Learning

Nick Bourne (Mid and West Wales): Will the Minister explain why his policies are failing to improve standards in Welsh schools according to the latest figures from the OECD. (WAQ57031)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

I have acknowledged that Wales' results in PISA 2009 are extremely disappointing. Whilst results within Wales have improved overall, there is clear evidence that, comparatively within the UK and internationally, the system is failing to consistently deliver good outcomes for our young people. My written statement on 2 February outlined the next steps I intend to take to drive up improvements throughout the education system.

Nick Bourne (Mid and West Wales): Will the Minister explain which aspects of his policies have led to the failing academic standards cited by Estyn in its report of Tuesday 25 January 2011. (WAQ57032)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

My written statement on 2 February provided an outline of how we will tackle the challenges to drive up improvement across the education sector.

Dai Lloyd (South Wales West): Will the Minister make a statement on the deferment of Tranche 3 of the School Building Improvement Grants and Band A of 21st Century Schools funding for the next 12 months. (WAQ57039)

Answer issued on 03 February 2011

The Tranche 3 funding was announced in July 2010. The 13 projects `approved in principle' indicated that spending would start in 2011-2012. Following the budget announcement in November 2010 and the significant impact on capital budgets there is a need to manage these within the funding envelope available. My officials are therefore working with Local Authorities (LAs) in order to ensure that the Assembly Government funding is made available at the right time, in line with the delivery of all projects. This may result in some projects starting at different times.

Local Authorities submitted their 21st Century Schools Strategic Outline Programmes on 10th December 2010. These will now be assessed through a robust evaluation process, with an announcement in Summer 2011.

To ask the Minister for the Economy and Transport

Mick Bates (Montgomeryshire): Who will form the specialist panel of industry experts appointed to give advice in relation to the Economic Renewal Programme. (WAQ57037)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

The Creative Sector Panel has been in place since October 2010, and I announced details of the membership in a Written Cabinet Statement on 11 October 2010. Membership of the remaining five Sector Panels is subject to the formal Public Appointments process. Interviews have been carried out and recommendations for appointments made. Once the successful candidates have accepted their appointments I will be in a position to issue a Written Cabinet Statement with full details of the Panel members and their backgrounds.

To ask the Minister for Health and Social Services

Dai Lloyd (South Wales West): Will the Minister make a statement on the possible continuation of an independent system of dealing with complaints to the NHS once local resolution has failed. (WAQ57038)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

I have taken the view that patients and staff will be better served by a more thorough and responsive process which seeks to resolve concerns as quickly as possible locally and which builds in elements of independence, for example, securing expert clinical advice, at those earlier stages.

Under the arrangements I propose to bring into effect from 1 April, investment is being made in building skills and capacity locally to enable better handling of concerns.

To ask the Minister for Rural Affairs

Brynle Williams (North Wales): Will the Minister provide details of the costs, to date, of the work to control Phytophthora Ramorum in Wales. (WAQ57033)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

Costs to date in respect of Phytophthora ramorum clearance are:

£61,686 clearance of young crops £78,049 ground surveying and sampling £34,725 aerial surveying £1,000 to the private sector for assistance with agent's fees. £586,080 over a period of 12 weeks on plant hire £76,000 civil engineering costs

In addition, associated staff costs to date are £19,166.

Brynle Williams (North Wales): To date, what have been a) the operational costs of the ongoing review of on-farm red tape, and b) the financial savings achieved by the review. (WAQ57034)

Answer issued on 03 February 2011

I refer you to the response I provided to WAQ 56082 (June 2010) which detailed costs totaling £2,626. In January of this year, two of my officials and Peredur Hughes, external advisor to the review, met with Richard Macdonald in London to discuss the DEFRA Farm Regulation Review and its linkages with our own review. The total operational costs of the ongoing review of on-farm red tape now stand at \pounds 2,762.50.

The objectives of the Red Tape Review is to rationalize and reduce where possible bureaucracy for farmers and to improve communications with the industry. I do not have, and will not be able to obtain without a significant administrative overhead and financial cost, a figure for the financial savings that have been achieved on behalf of the industry and/or individual farmers in Wales.

Brynle Williams (North Wales): What discussions has the Minister or her officials had with representatives of local authorities concerning the disposal of council agricultural holdings. (WAQ57035)

Answer issued on 02 February 2011

My officials have been in contact with local authorities to re-establish the Annual Report on Local Authority Smallholdings in Wales, which provides data on the disposal of local authority agricultural holdings. The 09/10 report, to which all local authorities contributed, was laid before the Assembly on 23 December 2010. While caution must be exercised when measuring minor differences and establishing trends within such a small demographic, the continuation of the report will allow more accurate statistics to be collated and so present future trends to a higher degree of certainty.

I will be providing a response to the recommendations of the Rural Development Sub-committee Inquiry into Local Authority Farms on the 7th February, which will include consideration of the the disposal of estate assets by local authorities.

Brynle Williams (North Wales): Will the Minister provide a breakdown of projected receipts from windfarms on the forestry commission estate in each year of their operational life. (WAQ57036)

Mick Bates (Montgomeryshire): Will the Minister give an update on recent correspondence and discussions with Defra, regarding the impact of the Defra funding settlement on Welsh local authorities in respect of their animal health and welfare enforcement activities. (WAQ57040)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

The budget for enforcement activity in Wales, as determined by DEFRA, has been set at £1.2 million for 2011/12 and is additional to existing funding available to all Welsh local authorities via the Revenue Support Grant. This figure has been communicated to the Welsh Local Government Association which has been informed that this figure should be used for the purposes of planning enforcement activity. The exact mechanism for determining how the funding will be used and distributed is the subject of discussions between my officials and the WLGA. This allocation is as a result of the recent UK Government Comprehensive Spending Review and is separate to the ongoing discussions regarding the devolution of animal health and welfare budgets to Wales.

Mick Bates (Montgomeryshire): What plans does the Minister have to ensure that the Animal Health section of Powys County Council's Trading Standards Service can continue to provide an effective system for animal health and welfare enforcement. (WAQ57041)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

The exact mechanism for determining how the funding will be used to provide effective animal health and welfare enforcement by each of the 22 local authorities in Wales is the subject of discussions between my officials and the WLGA.

Mick Bates (Montgomeryshire): What assessment has the Minister made of the impact of the Defra funding settlement on the Animal Health section of Powys County Council's Trading Standards Service. (WAQ57042)

Answer issued on 08 February 2011

The impact of the reduced funding settlement for Animal Health enforcement on all local authorities across Wales is, as yet, to be determined and will only become clear once decisions are taken in conjunction with the WLGA over the mechanism for distributing the allocation.

Brynle Williams (North Wales): Will the Minister provide details on each sale and acquisition of Forestry Commission land during the Third Assembly, identifying a) their size, b) the value of each sale or purchase and c) their location. (WAQ57043)

Nick Bourne (Mid and West Wales): What plans does the Minister have to implement a 'Big Society' initiative in Wales. (WAQ57029)
