Who we are and what we do



We are the **Welsh Parliament**Petitions Committee.

A **committee** is a group that meet to work things out and make changes.



There are shops and other businesses where people cannot pay for things with **cash**.



Cash means money in notes and coins.

We are starting to live in a **cashless** society.



People with **learning disabilities** are finding it harder to use cash in shops and businesses.

Mencap Cymru's petition



If a business doesn't take cash, you have to use a bank card or your smartphone.



It means people who don't have bank accounts can't buy anything. It leaves lots of people out of society.

Mencap Cymru started a petition.



Mencap Cymru is a charity supporting people with learning disabilities in Wales.



A **petition** is when a group of people want something to change.

More about the petition



Mencap Cymru said they want to make sure people can still pay with cash.



2,500 people signed Mencap Cymru's **petition** to show their support.



Our **Petitions Committee** found out more about this.

More about the petition



The petition asked the Welsh Government to



"Take action so that people with learning disabilities and other vulnerable adults can use cash to pay for things"



This is because

- more and more shops and other businesses are not taking cash
- many people with learning disabilities don't have bank accounts or bank cards



It means people with learning disabilities are being left out of society.

What our committee did



The **Petitions Committee** looked at reports and laws.

On 9 October and 23 October 2023, the committee heard information from




- Mencap Cymru

Living in a society without cash



We heard lots of stories about what happens if businesses don't take cash.

What happened when people tried to pay with cash



A man saved up his birthday money to buy a rugby shirt from a rugby club.

When he tried to pay, they told him he couldn't use cash so he didn't get the shirt.



Steven went to a coffee shop in Cardiff. He likes to spend his money going out and having coffee.



When he tried to pay, he was told he could only pay with a card.

Living in a society without cash



A man called Steven was very upset when he couldn't use cash at a hotel vending machine.



A young man wanted to buy a magazine. He got so upset when he couldn't use cash the police were called.



Not being able to pay for things with cash can change how people feel and what they can do.



It can make people feel upset and left out.



Living in a society without cash

Around **17 in 100** people would find it hard to be in a cashless society.



Some people can't get a bank account

Support workers can't pay for things on people's behalf.



Some people don't understand bank cards and how they work.



Businesses that don't take cash

People told us more about businesses who don't take cash including



- shops
- cafes and coffee shops



- sports clubs
- swimming pools



- theatres
- arts centres
- holiday parks

What businesses said




Business told us more about why they will or won't take cash.



 local banks are closing businesses can't get cash in and out of their bank account



 it's not safe to save up cash for days, then drive a long distance to take it to the nearest bank





 cashless payments can't happen if there is no Wi-Fi or it doesn't work.

How to solve this



People gave us lots of ideas about different ways of paying.



They told us shops should have a sign to say they **do take cash**.

We should



✓ teach businesses about how upset people can get if they can't use cash



✓ teach people with learning disabilities about money

✓ show people with learning
disabilities how to pay using an app on their smartphone

How to solve this



We want to make sure people have choice and control over their own money.



When care providers are inspected, inspectors should find out about how people are supported to



- learn about money
- access their own money
- find ways to get bank accounts and cards



Make sure that businesses can get cash and deposit cash locally.

For example, using a Banking Hub.

What we think should happen



Thank you to everyone who told us about using cash and when they can't.



We know how important it is for shops and cafes to accept cash.

We know it makes a big difference to people's lives.



We listened to you and have asked the **Welsh Government** to help.

What we think should happen



These are our recommendations to the Welsh Government.



- 1. When an organisation gets funding from the government, they should still take cash.
- 2. There should be more research about what happens if people can't use cash.



3. Teach businesses about what happens if people can't use cash.

What we think should happen



4. Work with the <u>UK Government</u> and the <u>Financial Conduct Authority</u> to find ways to help everyone to be included in a **cashless society**.



5. Make sure there are banks and cash machines in every local community.
