The Deputy Minister for Children (Huw Lewis): The Welsh Assembly Government has made clear its commitment to the UK Government's child poverty targets. We are committed to doing all we can within the powers available to us to help achieve the goal of eradicating child poverty in the UK by 2020.

The Children and Families (Wales) Measure, passed by the National Assembly on 10 November 2009,has allowed us to demonstrate that we, in Wales, are ahead of the game and take seriously the challenge of ensuring that we have a robust statutory framework in place to direct and support action on child poverty.

Despite the effects of the recession, Welsh Assembly Government statistics published in November 2009 showed an improvement in half of the child poverty indicators for which we have sufficient data available for an assessment to be made. The statistics relate to indicators monitoring progress against our child poverty strategy targets set out in "Eradicating Child Poverty in Wales: Measuring Success", published in October 2006.

It is vital that the new strategy creates a sense of unified national purpose, working with the UK Government to eradicate child poverty by 2020. The UK Government will be developing its new Child Poverty Strategy to 2020 alongside the Welsh Strategy and it will be important that the Welsh Strategy dovetails with the UK Strategy in view of the significant policy levers at the UK level that have the capacity to reduce levels of income poverty in particular.

It is anticipated that a first draft of the new Child Poverty Strategy will be considered by the Children and Young People Cabinet Committee soon. This will be followed by a period of consultation later this year.

To date, two National Research Centres have been established in Wales- the Research Institute of Visual Computing, and the Wales Institute of Social and Economic Research, Data and Methods (WISERD). The Welsh Assembly Government will continue to support Centres that have demonstrable world-class expertise, a critical mass of research capacity, that are focused on Welsh Assembly Government priority sectors and that have a focus on higher level skills provision.

We will continue with our existing action to create a network of Research Centres in Wales and ensure that the research undertaken increasingly leads to commercialisation and economic impacts as reflected in the priorities set out in "For Our Future", the national priorities for Welsh Assembly Government's research match funding and reflecting the importance of developing STEM opportunities in Wales. (science, technology, engineering and mathematics)

The priorities are:

- Digital economy (ICT).
- Low carbon economy (including climate change mitigation).
- Health and biosciences.
- · Advanced engineering and manufacturing.

The Higher Education Funding Council for Wales established the Reconfiguration and Collaboration Fund to strengthen the Welsh higher education sector by promoting collaboration between institutions. Lesley Griffiths: Skills are a key driver of both employment and productivity. DCELLS responded quickly to the economic downturn, with a number of targeted initiatives to help individuals and businesses.

ProAct, which provides firms with financial support to increase the skills levels of their workforce has, to date, supported 8357 individuals through 221 training applications.

We also extended ReAct, to help individuals who have been made redundant, return to employment as quickly as possible. We are tackling basic skills in the workplace through our work with Trade Unions and the Basic Skills Employers Pledge.

We have committed £79.7million during the current financial year for investment in our mainstream Apprenticeship programme and £20million in special apprenticeships programmes for young people in specific sectors.

There continues to be high demand for support under the Workforce Development Programme and during the current financial year 1,753 employers have joined the programme, representing 78,603 employees.

The Sector Priorities Fund Pilot Programme is piloting activity with Sector Skills Councils (SSCs) in order to inform recommendations for, and effect a smooth transition to the 2011 Sector Priorities Fund identified in "Skills that Work for Wales". This will ensure the delivery of post-16 skills provision that is more responsive and aligned to the needs of employers. By developing strategic and sustainable partnerships within and between sectors and training providers, we hope to: raise skills levels of employment; raise pay levels of employment; and, enable participants to gain part qualifications.

The number of people in Bed and Breakfast accommodation has declined by 14%

In July last year I launched our Homelessness Plan for Wales. This sets out a long term vision based on prevention and early intervention.

I have included homelessness in the Housing Legislative Competence Order which will enable us to change the legislation to meet the needs of Wales.

The financial and housing market environment remains difficult, but we have in place a wide range of action to prevent homelessness. I am confident that with the continued help of the many organisations that play a part in tackling homelessness, we can continue to make progress.

In July 2008 guidance was issued to support Community Safety Partnerships (CSPs) and treatment providers to improve the quality and capacity of residential rehabilitation and inpatient detoxification (Tier 4) services in Wales.

To assist with this £1m of recurring revenue funding has been made available. Last year this funding provided an additional 80 residential rehabilitation and 37 inpatient detoxification places. In addition CSPs and Tier 4 providers have also been encouraged to access the Substance Misuse Capital Fund to improve the standard of existing facilities and a number of Tier 4 providers have already benefited as a result of this funding. The details of which can be found in my recently published Substance Misuse Annual Progress Report.

A seminar is planned for later this year to review progress and to consider whether any further support is required.

Moreover, the Sports Council for Wales are putting structures in place to ensure that there is an effective link and pathway from school participation in sport into joining local sports clubs.

Answer issued on 02 February 2010

As I have set out in my updates to the National Assembly for Wales, we have put in place a comprehensive programme to eradicate bovine TB in Wales. We are tackling the disease on all fronts and have already taken considerable steps to address the problem of cattle spreading the disease.

In September 2008 I announced that all cattle herds in Wales would be tested for bovine TB over a 15 month period as part of the TB Health Check Wales initiative. This came to an end in December 2009 and resulted in the slaughter of 185 infected cattle from 96 herds previously thought to be free from bovine TB. Sixty two of these herds were located in North Wales, an area not previously considered to have a significant bovine TB problem. As a consequence of the TB Health Check, the number of overdue tests has been reduced considerably. All cattle herds in Wales will be subject to annual TB testing in 2010 which also means all herds will need to meet Pre-Movement Testing requirements.

A consultation is currently underway on the Tuberculosis and Brucellosis (Wales) Order 2010 which proposes changes to both Pre-Movement Testing exemptions and compensation arrangements, so that farmers who do not comply with TB testing regulations see their compensation reduced.

I believe that we need to deal with all sources of infection in order to achieve eradication. Previous studies have concluded that badgers are a source of bovine TB so in my most recent statement on 13 January 2010 I announced that a limited badger cull, alongside stricter cattle control measures, will take place in a pilot area in west Wales.

We are also setting up a framework to prevent and manage bovine TB in camelids and monitoring levels of bovine TB in feral goats and wild deer.

Information on the TB Eradication Programme, including details of all the measures implemented so far and links to my statements can be found on the Welsh Assembly Government bovine TB website (www.wales.gov.uk/bovinetb) and I will continue to report annually to the Rural Development Sub-Committee.

The Strategic Action Plan for the Welsh dairy industry was launched in November 2007. To date work has focused on efficiency on farms, driving innovation in new production techniques, to new product development. The main aims of the strategy – to provide a sustainable, profitable, efficient and innovative Welsh Dairy Sector, which benefits the people of Wales – are still relevant today, and partners across industry are working together to deliver these aims.

Dairy farmers, like all our farmers in Wales, must look to improve productivity through reducing costs and increasing output Through Farming Connect we have worked to encourage dairy farmers to adopt more sustainable approaches. We have also worked to develop and demonstrate production systems and management techniques that improve herd health and welfare, to contribute to producer profitability. My view is that this provides us with a strong foundation, and the basis for promoting the dairy industry in Wales.

The dairy industry is vitally important to the Welsh economy, and I am deeply conscious of the pressures it faces. Dairy farming is a dynamic business and, like all businesses, can never remain static. In Wales we may limit exposure to the highly volatile world market and avoid direct competition with the world's lowest cost milk producers by endeavouring to increase the proportion of milk being used for value added products and highlight the high animal welfare and environmental standards practised in Wales.

I believe that there is a positive future for the sector if it embraces the vision contained within the Strategic Action Plan and acts to capitalise on opportunities by working together, increasing production, improving efficiency, increasing product innovation, and concentrating on added value branded markets.
