# Climate Change

#### Introduction

Compelling scientific evidence pinpoints the activities of humankind – particularly the combustion of fossil fuels – as being largely responsible for warming in the atmosphere since the pre-industrial age.

The former Chief Scientific Advisor to the UK Government described climate change as 'the biggest problem facing us globally this century. There is no bigger problem. The threat is quite simple; it's a threat to our civilisation'. Opinion polling suggests more than 60 per cent of people support 'every possible action' to limit climate change. Wales will be subject to increasing impacts, both direct and indirect, as a result of climate change. Predicted effects of climate change in Wales include':

- Increase in temperature, with summer water shortages
- Increase in winter rainfall and more frequent intense rainfall
- Reduction in snowfall and increased growing season
- An increase in river and coastal flooding
- Further habitat and species loss
- Changes to the landscape

## Current and proposed legislative competence of the Assembly

Under the *Government of Wales Act 2006*, the National Assembly for Wales can seek legislative competence through Acts of Parliament or Legislative Competence Orders (LCOs) to make a piece of law in the form of an 'Assembly Measure'. Measures can only be made in a specific policy area (or 'Matter') added to one of the 20 'Fields' (or broad subject areas) which are contained in Schedule 5 to the Act.

As "Environment" is Field 6 of Schedule 5 to the Act, the National Assembly for Wales can seek Measure-making powers in this area. However, the biggest drivers of climate change, such as transport and large-scale energy generation, are mostly influenced by fiscal measures and UK legislation, which are reserved to the UK government.

# Forthcoming EU and UK primary legislation

- The Waste Framework Directive is currently being revised.
- The Climate Change Bill was published on 14 November 2007.
- A White Paper on Energy was published in May 2007.

#### **EU Policy**

The EU has wide jurisdiction over environmental matters. It is increasingly using this jurisdiction to influence the drivers of climate change.

- An EU target for 20 per cent reduction in carbon emissions by 2020, and for 20 per cent of energy generation from renewable sources by 2020, was proposed on 23 January 2008.
- The European Commission is developing a legal framework to cover carbon capture and geological storage, to be published in 2008.
- On 7 February 2007, the European Commission adopted a Communication outlining a new strategy to reduce CO<sub>2</sub> emissions from new cars and vans.
- On 10 January 2007, the European Commission published a Communication on a climate change strategy for Europe, with the aim of limiting climate change to 2°C above pre-industrial levels.
- Also on 10 January 2007, the European Commission published a strategic review of the European energy situation, including a complete set of European Energy Policy measures.

- The European Climate Change Programme aims to identify and develop all the necessary elements of an EU strategy to implement the Kyoto Protocol. The Second European Climate Change Programme was launched in October 2005.
- On 20 December 2006, the European Commission adopted a proposal for legislation to include aviation in the EU Emissions Trading Scheme (ETS). The Environment Ministers reached unanimous political agreement with the Commission's proposal on 20 December 2007.

# Key Welsh Government strategy documents and action plans:

- The Renewable energy Route Map for Wales consultation document was published in February 2008<sup>vi</sup>.
- The One Wales agreement commits the Welsh Assembly Government to cut carbon emissions by 3 per cent year-on-year by 2011 in areas of devolved competence<sup>vii</sup>. The Climate Change Commission for Wales provides advice to the Welsh Assembly Government on climate change.
- A consultation document, "Planning for Climate Change", finished its consultation period on 30 March 2007<sup>x</sup>.
- The Environment Strategy for Wales<sup>vii</sup> and its accompanying Action Plan<sup>viii</sup> are the principal means through which climate change will be tackled.
