ReAct and ProAct January 2011

The paper provides information on the ReAct, ReAct II, ProAct and Skills Growth Wales programmes. ReAct is a programme of funding for training for individuals facing redundancy, and ProAct a financial support package to help viable businesses fund training during quiet time to up-skill staff in readiness for the upturn. ReAct II and Skills Growth Wales are successor programmes to ReAct and ProAct.

This paper is intended to be a policy guide and constituents should seek individual advice where necessary.

ReAct and ProAct

1. ReAct

The Welsh Government Redundancy Action Scheme (ReAct) was launched in its current form in October 2008¹.

The scheme provides funding for training for individuals facing redundancy, and can also assist employers downsizing or recruiting new staff.²

ReAct is part-financed by European funds and has received $\pm 5.4m$ European Social Fund Regional Competitiveness & Employment Programme funding (national funding $\pm 14m$) and $\pm 18.7m$ from the European Social Fund Convergence Programme (national funding $\pm 23m$).³

On 9 December 2010, the Deputy Minister for Science, Innovation and Skills, Lesley Griffiths AM announced the launch of a ReAct II programme that will come into force on 1 April 2011 and will replace the existing ReAct programme.

Information relating to both the existing ReAct programme and the recently announced ReAct II programme is set out below.

2. ReAct: Individuals

Support for individuals is available for eligible applicants to increase their skills and remove barriers to learning, or returning to work, and the three elements to the ReAct scheme for individuals are:

- Recruitment & Training Support;
- Discretionary Award Vocational Training
- Discretionary Award Miscellaneous⁴.

Applicants have their training needs assessed by Careers Wales, which will also advise on suitable training courses and training venues, and under this part of the scheme the following financial support is available:

- 100 per cent of training costs to acquire new skills (up to a maximum of £2,500)
- help with the cost of special equipment required for training
- reimbursement of travel costs to training courses
- overnight accommodation costs, where appropriate
- a contribution towards the cost of materials required for training
- reimbursement of childcare costs (subject to limits and conditions).⁵

The ReAct scheme is available for individuals who:

- have become unemployed in the last six months as a result of redundancy, are currently unemployed, and who have not been in continuous employment for 6 weeks or more since being made redundant; or
- are currently under notice of redundancy; and
- have not undertaken any publicly funded training since being made redundant, including the work-based learning suite of programs.⁶

The Welsh Government has produced a document entitled <u>ReAct Guidance Notes:</u> <u>information to help you complete your application</u>, which provides some further information on eligibility. This states that support is available if you are a

resident in Wales on the date of issue of notice of redundancy, although an application will be considered if you live outside Wales on this date but are being made redundant from a company in Wales. Individuals must apply while still under notice of redundancy and once made redundant should seek advice from their Learning Skills Council office. Individuals must be aged 25 or over, although those under 25 will be considered if not entitled to New Deal.

Individuals are only eligible for funding for up to six months after they have been made redundant and will not be eligible for ReAct funding if they start working for another employer before registering for ReAct funding.⁷

3. ReAct: Employers

The elements of support offered by ReAct to employers for taking someone on who has been made redundant are as follows:

Employer Recruitment Support funds employers who recruit individuals made redundant in the past six months. The award offers up to £2,080 paid in four instalments as a contribution towards wage costs.⁸

Employer Training Support can fund up to 70 per cent of any training costs, up to a maximum of £1,000.

The amount payable will be based on the costs an employer has to pay towards providing the training, in line with the following conditions.

- Training must be relevant to the job and approved by the Welsh Government.
- Training must improve the skills of the individual

Where possible, the employer must make every effort to provide training to at least NVQ level 2 (or equivalent).⁹

Employers can choose whether to apply for Recruitment Support alone or Recruitment and Training Support. Employer Training Support can only be used in conjunction with Employer Recruitment Support.

Employer Recruitment and Training Support is available if:

- The business is expanding and the post is new; or
- The individual seeks a justifiable replacement for a vacant post;
- The job is at least 16 hours per week;
- The job is expected to last for at least 12 months;
- The job is not being supported by any other public or European Fund; and
- The business has not reached the 'de minimis' threshold for State Aid rules.¹⁰

Individuals who might otherwise have been eligible are disqualified for funding if they have:

- Started working for the business before the application for ReAct funding has been approved;
- Received paid employment of any kind continuously for six weeks or more in the six months prior to applying for support; or
- Undertaken any publicly-funded training, including Work Based Learning programmes, since being made redundant.

4. ReAct II

On 9 December 2010, the Deputy Minister for Science, Innovation and Skills, Lesley Griffiths AM announced the launch of a ReAct II programme that will come into force on 1 April 2011 and will replace the existing ReAct programme:

The new programme represents a change of emphasis from training aimed at updating the skills of redundant workers to an enhanced support structure to encourage more companies to take on more people who have been made redundant and create jobs.

To do this I will be increasing the wage subsidy on offer to employers who recruit a redundant person as long as the job provides a minimum of 25 hours work a week or more. The subsidy will increase from $\pounds 2,080$ to $\pounds 3,000$ and will continue to be paid over the first year of employment. I am retaining the $\pounds 1,000$ maximum contribution towards the training costs of new employees while our contribution will be 50% rather than 70%. The subsidy for employers recruiting a redundant worker on a part-time basis, working for between 16 and 24 hours a week, will be $\pounds 1,500$. Finally, the maximum vocational training grant available to individuals will be $\pounds 1,500$ instead of the $\pounds 2,500$ currently available through ReAct.¹¹

6. ProAct

ProAct was a financial support package 'designed to help viable businesses cope with the downturn and use quiet periods to upskill staff to prepare them for when the upturn comes'.¹²

It was available to businesses which had introduced short time working and faced the threat of redundancies and, broadly, offered:

- Up to £2000 per individual towards training costs
- A wage subsidy of up to £2000 (at a rate of £50 a day) per individual whilst this training is being undertaken (up to 12 months)¹³

In a Welsh Government Decision Report of 28 June 2010, the Deputy Minister for Science, Innovations and Skills agreed the closure of the ProAct panel on the 30th June 2010. It was also agreed that the remainder of the funding available under the ProAct scheme would be made available for the successor scheme to ProAct**ProAct Skills Growth Wales**.

The office of the Deputy Minister for Science, Innovation and Skills has provided the Members' Research Service with data relating to the ProAct scheme, and this is set out below. These figures relate to ProAct only and do not include information on ProAct Skills Growth Wales. Separate data on ProAct Skills Growth Wales is set outin Section 7 below.

7. ProAct Skills Growth Wales

ProAct – Skills Growth Wales is a 'financial support package designed to help Welsh companies grow by funding high level or new technology skills training'.¹⁴

Funding is available at an average of £3000 per person to pay for high level and new technology training 'that will directly help to bring about growth – in turnover, profit and/or employment'. It is available for growing companies that can show how the funding will help them grow, or companies that have identified a significant growth opportunity and need training to take advantage of it. The funding 'is for companies who would not otherwise have been able to fund this training or undertake it as they would desire'.Eligibility criteria is as set out below, and applications can be submitted from 1st April 2010 until 31st March 2011:

A predicted growth over the next 12 months of ONE of the following:

- 10% increase in turnover
- 10% increase in profit
- Increase of at least 10 employees
