Forestry

Introduction

Woodlands are a renewable natural resource which contribute to a successful economy, better environment, healthy communities and improved quality of life. Woodlands contribute to climate change mitigation through carbon sequestration: as trees grow, they convert atmospheric carbon dioxide into the carbon that forms the basis of their roots, branches, and leaves. Trees also reduce soil erosion by wind and water, and they provide shade that helps to moderate temperature.

Forestry Commission Wales acts as the Welsh Assembly Government's department of forestry, and looks after the 38 per cent of Welsh woodlands that comprise the Welsh Assembly Government's estate. A total of 14 per cent of Wales' land area is covered by woodlandⁱ.

Current and proposed legislative competence of the Assembly

Under the *Government of Wales Act 2006*, the National Assembly for Wales can seek legislative competence through Acts of Parliament or Legislative Competence Orders (LCOs) to make a piece of law in the form of an 'Assembly Measure'. Measures can only be made in a specific policy area (or 'Matter') added to one of the 20 'Fields' (or broad subject areas) which are contained in Schedule 5 of the Act.

As "Agriculture, fisheries, forestry and rural development" is Field 1 of Schedule 5 to the Act", the National Assembly for Wales can seek Measure-making powers in this area. There are currently no Matters in this Field.

Forthcoming EU and UK primary legislation

- The *Climate Change Bill*ⁱⁱⁱ was introduced in Parliament on 14 November 2007. It has now moved to the House of Commons for consideration. The aim is to receive Royal Assent by autumn 2008.
- A Communication on an EU Forest Action Plan was adopted on 15 June 2006¹. The Action Plan was approved by the Agriculture and Fisheries Council in October 2006.
- On 30 June 2008 the Department for Business, Enterprise and Regulatory Reform (DBERR) published the consultation document 'Towards Carbon Capture and Storage'r. The consultation consults on aspects of the proposed EU Directive on the *Geological Storage of Carbon Dioxide^{vi}* and invites views on the principle of 'carbon capture readiness' for combustion plants and the regulation of Carbon Dioxide storage.

EU policy

EU involvement in forestry issues is set out in the EU Forestry Strategy^{vii}. The EU produces forestry plans based on Member State forestry policy, and provides some financial support for forestry and woodland management via the structural funds programmes and support for rural development. It also funds research into forestry and forest-based industries. The EU Biomass Action Plan of December 2005 states that the Commission "will encourage Member States to establish national biomass action plans"viii.

Key Welsh Government strategy documents and action plans

- Woodlands for Wales is the Welsh Government's forestry strategyix. A progress report on the first five years of the strategy is also available^x. Proposals for a revised *Woodlands for Wales* strategy has gone out for consultation and is due for closer in October 2008^{xi}.
- The One Wales agreement includes a commitment to providing support for indigenous woodlands and the creation of a Welsh National Forest of native trees.

The *Rural Development Plan for Wales 2007-2013* was approved by the Commission in February 2008^{×ii}. Activities under Axis 1 are specifically aimed at improving the competitiveness of the Agriculture and Forestry sector.

- The Environment Strategy for Wales^{xiii} and its accompanying Action Plan^{xiv} include 11 outcomes related to forestry. A report was published in September 2007 showing the first year's progress on delivering the Environment Strategy and broader environmental indicators, as well as progress against the Action Plan points^{xv}.
- The Renewable Energy Route Map for Wales consultation document was published in February 2008^{xvi} and proposes actions that would encourage the use of wood for biomass energy. The responses from the consultation will help the development of a Welsh Assembly Government energy strategy by early 2009.
