The Minister for Education and Skills (Leighton Andrews): The EU proposes to integrate the current Lifelong Learning Programme, Youth in Action, and international higher education programmes (eg Erasmus Mundus) into one programme Erasmus for All (EfA). The intention of the new programme is to support increased emphasis on education and skills in the overarching Europe 2020 strategy

The EfA budget cannot be ratified until the EU financial package for 2014-2020 – the Multi-Annual Financial Framework – has been adopted at the end of this year at the earliest. Once the overall EfA budget is known, Education Ministers and MEPs will look to allocate resources to the different sub-programmes, activities and sectors.

The Welsh Government will continue to contribute financially to the management of EU lifelong learning programmes in the new programming period. Currently the cost to the Welsh Government is over £200,000 per annum which gives Welsh organisations access to bid for funds, and supports the administration and management of the programme.

Leighton Andrews: Arrangements are already in train for discussions with the EU Commissioner for Education, Culture, Multilingualism and Youth and with key individuals in EU institutions in the months ahead, and I will be raising the Erasmus for All proposals at those discussions. It is essential that the development of EU programmes for the next Multi-Annual Financial Framework period, such as Erasmus for All, is also informed by the views, experiences and forward needs of Europe's regional administrations, including Wales. In addition, my officials remain engaged with UK and EU counterparts on the detail of the Erasmus for All proposals as they develop.

Leighton Andrews: The Welsh Government strongly supports EU funding programmes that encourage the learning of modern foreign languages. However, at present it is not clear how much funding will be available for allocation within Member States to support modern foreign languages under the Erasmus for All programme, or how that would be accessed. Negotiations are still ongoing between Member States on the programme architecture and levels of likely resource.

Leighton Andrews: The current arrangements for the Erasmus fee waiver operate on a largely reciprocal basis throughout the UK. My officials are engaged in the work of a Student Mobility Joint Steering Group operating across the UK and tasked to review current incentives, financial support and obstacles to outward student mobility, and making recommendations to ensure its continuation and increase. As that work moves forward I will be considering advice on the final recommendations of the Group, the UK Government's response to those recommendations and any implications for the future of the Erasmus Fee waiver scheme in Wales from 2013-14.

The Deputy Minister for Skills (Jeff Cuthbert): The Welsh Government and NOMS Wales share the ambition of reducing re-offending and protecting the public. This involves the delivery of appropriate skills interventions for those in custody and for those serving sentences in the community which aims to reduce re-offending.

All offenders received into custodial establishments in Wales undertake an induction process which includes assessing their learning and skills strengths and needs. Offenders undertake an initial assessment to determine their functional literacy and numeracy skills along with any learning difficulties. This is followed by to more in-depth diagnostic assessments that lead to an individual learning plan which they will follow throughout their sentence. Basic skills provision is offered to all those who are identified with a need.

The Welsh Government has a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in place with NOMS Wales for the commissioning of education and learning in the prisons in Wales. All Welsh prisons offer essential, vocational and non-vocational skills provision and the majority of the courses are for accredited qualifications. Essential skills including literacy are delivered as either stand alone courses or embedded

into other subject areas. The delivery of literacy skills within prisons in Wales is a key target and forms part of the core provision detailed within the MoU.

Jeff Cuthbert: The Welsh Government (WG) encourages a wide range of providers and voluntary organisations to work in partnership to deliver learning to meet the needs of older people. We acknowledge the benefits that learning brings to older people through our The Strategy for Older People and our current policy statement: Delivering Community Learning for Wales.

At present, DfES promotes the benefits of learning through a range of activities. We work with NIACE Dysgu Cymru (NDC) to deliver learning campaigns including Adult Learners' Week. Such campaigns have been successful in engaging around 14,000 people per year over the age of 50 through over 1,000 fun taster sessions and activities across Wales.

WG also supports the Inspire! Adult Learner Awards, which includes a category for 'Older Learner of the Year'. This high profile event attracts significant media attention and highlights inspiring examples of how participation in learning can transform lives.

NDC is also currently leading a review into ACL Strategic Partnerships on behalf of DfES. The review is looking at a number of key issues including how effective current partnerships are in managing and developing provision in their areas. This review will influence future policy to ensure availability of and access for the local population to education and training. Participation in learning by older people will also be addressed by identifying learning as an important element of the Older People's strategy.

Our current policy statement includes the requirement for providers to move towards a target of 80% provision aimed at target groups; however, the remaining 20% of ACL Grant Funding can be used for innovative provision based on locally determined needs including more informal learning. We encourage providers to use this flexibly to re-engage adults, including older adults, who have not participated in learning for some time and for providers to be innovative in their approach in recognising the benefits of non formal learning i.e. the provision of learning through clubs for older learners.

DfES is presently considering future ACL policy, but in the interim will be asking Partnerships to ensure that provision is made available, is suitable and is of interest to those aged over 65. Partnerships will be encouraged to work with Older Peoples Coordinators so that they are better informed of the needs of older learners in their area. This is in direct response to the recent Estyn report on Skills for Older Learners: the impact of adult community learning on the well being of older learners that 'the current emphasis on skills for employment has resulted in gaps in the provision for other older learners, mainly those aged over 65'. Estyn also state that enrolment in adult education falls dramatically in the over 70 age group.

Welsh Government will also consider means of extending the scope of the Older Peoples Wellbeing Monitor for Wales (Government Social Research 2009) to accommodate a 'measure of wellbeing through learning' and 'access to employment'. http://wales.gov.uk/topics/olderpeople/research/wellbeingmonitor2009/?lang=en

The Minister for Finance and Leader of the House (Jane Hutt): The total cost for the first three years of the contract to deliver the National Survey for Wales is £3.18m. The contract is set to run for three years, with the option to extend up to five years. The cost mainly covers fieldwork, which includes sending letters to the addresses selected to take part and other activities such as the field test, data collection and data processing. It is not possible to provide the exact cost breakdown requested because the information is commercially sensitive. In addition to the main survey contract, there are additional development costs for technical advice from external experts and work to test and refine new survey questions. The total additional development costs are approximately £0.14m.

We have provided additional funding to all Health Boards in Wales to enable them to improve services and deliver care to patients with chronic conditions in their locality, including epilepsy. Health Boards are responsible for planning and delivering the services which meet the needs of their local population, working closely with all partners, including the Third Sector.

Lesley Griffiths: The National Exercise Referral Scheme (NERS) provides opportunities for patients with certain health conditions. The Scheme aims to provide a safe and effective community based exercise opportunities suitable to client base that complies with national standards, offer suitable nutrition advice as appropriate in partnership with community dieticians and or accredited local slimming groups,

promote healthy weight loss and improve mental wellbeing and physical health of clients and increase the long-term adherence in physical activity of clients

Exercise referral provides an opportunity for patients to access a high quality supervised exercise programme, with the aim of encouraging long-term participation in physical activity.

The Scheme has been designed to build upon the best practice from the UK and the current evidence base as well as operating to national standards. The Scheme has been supported by the Welsh Government, working in partnership with Local Authorities, the National Public Health Service and Local Health Boards (LHBs).

Lesley Griffiths: The NHS Wales Medical Director wrote to Health Boards on 30 January 2012 requesting an update on the number of patients being monitored following a metal on metal (MoM) hip implant. This data is currently being collected and I will write to you with the all-Wales figures as soon as they are available.

It is important to note the MHRA has only withdrawn one particular MoM implant device (the DePuy ASR hip replacement implant), and not all MoM implants.
